What would be more effective and useful for wider family support

For parents and caregivers

- ♦ Support groups
- ♦ Education and Training
- ♦ Respite, Carer relief
- ♦ Information and Advice
- ♦ Counselling

For siblings

- ♦ Self esteem building courses
- Help to Understand their siblings problems and how best to deal with them (when the information comes from a parent it can seem like playing favourites between the children).
- ♦ Sibling camps
- ♦ Youth groups (more often)
- ♦ Counselling as and when needed

Key issues

Availability

Large cities vs smaller ones; Finite period of intervention;; Lack of consistency; Capacity and Capability in Education/Health sector, Information/Advice

Accessibility

Location, Advocacy; Funding; Cultural appropriateness; Respite, Recreation.

Affordability

Funding – 'The money helps but it isn't everything'. SES

Ways forward

Educate ALL teachers - they need to have to do a paper on autism, the ones already teaching need to do a educational course
